YOUTH 2 YOUTH: PARTNERS 4 PEACE



Job Corps partnered with the National Forum on Youth Violence Prevention and My Brother's Keeper in an effort to support violence prevention. As a result of the partnership, an anti-violence initiative created and led by Job Corps students nationwide known as Youth 2 Youth (Y2Y): Partners 4 Peace was formed. Aimed at preventing violence on Job Corps Centers and in the communities, Y2Y Job Corps students are engaging in anti-violence solution based discussions, learning how violence has affected their peers and taking a stand against violence. The national kick-off for "Y2Y: Partners 4 Peace Week" began Monday, September 14, and concluded on September 18. The week was packed with a multitude of anti-violence events led by Job Corps Center students and staff across the country.

Y2Y: Partners 4 Peace Week at the Cleveland Job Corps Center (CJCC) commenced with a candlelight vigil. Approximately 315 people unitarily convened in the CJCC courtyard. CJCC, and the Cleveland community as a whole, has recently been shaken by the tragic homicide of two children on Cleveland's eastside. CJCC students held a candlelight vigil in hope of uniting against violence and to begin the healing process by making a positive change on Center and in the community.

During the course of the week, students were busy creating an anti-violence video. They also signed pledge cards promising to stop the violence and to become a part of the solution as well as participated in an essay contest writing on 'How violence has affected my life and How Job Corps has helped me'.

A trio of phenomenal speakers that included; Project Love Facilitator and Retired Educator Julie Wynne-Martin, Black Man Army's Sargent Major Stokes and Cleveland Job Corps Center's Property Manager Jerry Campbell, joined the Cleveland Job Corps (CJCC) students and staff in closing out the Y2Y: Partners 4 Peace Week. The guest speakers not only revved up the crowd at the CJCC Pep Rally, but also during the CJCC sponsored Peace Walk on September 18. After the Pep Rally, the Cleveland Police Department escorted students, staff and guests during the Peace March from the CJCC on Coit Rd. and 140th St. up to Saint Claire and 152nd St. and back to the Center. Three local media stations were present along with a multitude of cheering pedestrians. The Pep Rally and Peace Walk was a wonderful way to end the week and a great way to involve students in the ongoing efforts to increase a positive public image for the center.

Cleveland Job Corps Center Director, William Houston, received an invitation to return to "Kaleidoscope," a weekly public affairs program produced in partnership with the Urban League of Greater Cleveland, Kaleidoscope Magazine and News Channel 5. Houston to the show in 2012 to introduce the city of Cleveland to the new operator and center director. This time, Houston was given the platform to discuss the Job Corps Program and was permitted to bring a guest. Houston brought Cleveland Job Corps Center, State Tested Nursing Assistant student Oni Mosley, 21 years old, from Garfield Heights, OH. Mosley shared with Bibb and the viewing audience the reasons she enrolled in Job Corps and how it has affected her life. She provided a moving and passionate account of how her life was going nowhere fast without an education and why she decided to enroll in Job Corps, this past June, where she is currently pursuing her High School Diploma and State Tested Nursing Assistant training. When Bibb asked Mosley, "What has been the greatest gain while in Job Corps?" Mosley responded "Self Confidence," to which the viewing audience gasped with empathy. After providing information on Job Corps, Houston announced the upcoming Open House to be held at the Cleveland Job Corps Center at 10am on October 29, 2015. The Open House is a wonderful opportunity for the community to come and see inside the tightly secured campus and view one of the cities crown jewels for the past 50 years. The segment is scheduled to air Sunday, October 4, 2015, at 12:30pm.

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CD'S CORNER

In recent months, Job Corps centers across the nation have been tasked with the challenge of stepping up safety and security efforts. Cleveland Job Corps Center (CJCC) will continue to implement proactive measures to protect the safety and security of all our students and staff members. Although every Job Corps center is required to have a center safety and security plan in an effort to prepare and hopefully prevent a major incident, CJCC plans to continue to work with local law enforcement, ensuring the active safety committee (that includes students) is developing and maintaining a comprehensive plan that exceeds the Policy and Requirements Handbook (PRH) requirements and develop a strategic and efficient safety and security procedures with Serrato Corporation's Director of Security and Safety, Daniel Serrato, Retired Homeland Security Patrol Agent in Charge (PAIC).



The CJCC family has embraced all the edicts that have come down from not only the National Office of Job Corps, but also Serrato Corporation. For the past three years, the Center's leadership team has been conducting weekly general health and safety inspections. This past month the Center has conducted a Center-wide health and safety inspection, two active shooter drills and participated in the Youth 2 Youth: Partners 4 Peace campaign. The students, staff of the CJCC and the community, particularly our Cleveland Law Enforcement, have responded in a very positive and supportive manner. Over the next few weeks, the Center will continue to review the safety and security procedures while ensuring the CJCC continues to be a safe place where students work towards reaching their career goals.

The Center's staff is charged with focusing on the CJCC mission: to develop and cultivate working relationships with heart felt commitment, unsurpassed courage and unbiased honor, while caring for the students under our responsibility. Granted we may not be able to prevent every negative occurrence, but we will continue to work towards strengthening our safety and security procedures for every student, staff and visitor that steps on our Center.

INTERNATIONAL GUEST

The CJCC, in partnership with the Cleveland Council on World Affairs (CCWA), recently hosted a delegation from Middle East/North Africa on September 14, 2015. The international guest traveled stateside to learn more about workforce development and alternatives in higher education. Inspirational emergent leaders from Iraq, Morocco, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia journeyed across Cleveland learning about best practices and successful case studies of workforce development programs. Given the diversification of Cleveland's economy and the subsequent proliferation of career training and skills-based trade apprenticeship programs, Cleveland is a magnet for workforce development groups coming to the United States through the State Department. These visitors are invited to the United States under the auspices of the Department of State's International Visitor Leadership Program. "You have such an impressive array of programs at the Job Corps, and our visitors were blown away by the incredible quality of your curriculum and on-campus accommodations," expressed CCWA International Program Officer, Katie Ferman. "Given the immense success of this session, we certainly hope you would be open to meeting with other international visitors in the future who are interested in learning more about the Job Corps' programs."



CARPENTRY TRAINING

The Cleveland Job Corps Center’s (CJCC) Carpentry class was asked by the Carpenter’s Joint Apprenticeship Training Committee (JATC) to conduct a controlled disassembly of a full-scale 10-room house mock up, and the carpentry instructors happily agreed. The instructors and their students departed for Richfield, OH on September 8, 2015, and it took five days to complete the demolition. Participating in a controlled disassembly gives students a chance to gain valuable

experience about the structure of a house and how a house is properly framed. According to Carpentry Instructor Daniel Volpe, “being the ‘farm team (a team whose role is to provide experience and training)’ for the Carpenter’s Union, this opportunity not only gave the students valuable training experience, it gives the Carpentry Instructors a chance to showcase the students and their skills to the union.” The new Statewide Training Coordinator Vince Wright, as well as representatives from both the Regional and the International United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, were in attendance during the week. This veritable who’s who list of Union Carpenters were there to help with the transition to the new training director and instructors for the Union Apprenticeship.

The representatives were very impressed with the manner in which our students were able to work together as a group in spite of them being beginner level pre-apprentices. After conversing with the students, a few of the union representatives commented on how impressed they were to observe the students skill level and work ethic. They also acknowledged they noticed continuous daily progress and growth with the students. The students in the Carpentry trade were excited to see how training was conducted at the apprenticeship training center and how it mirrored the training they received at Job Corps.

The CJCC was pleased to have Urban League of Greater Cleveland Advocate Counselor and Co-Author of Mission 31 Vitality, Talicia S. Cooper as their guest speaker. On September 10, 2015, Cooper began a two-part session titled “*Building a New You;*” she spoke with students about three personality types: Builders, Cutters and Maintainers. Cooper instructed the students to explore the behaviors associated with the three personality types and then identify themselves with the appropriate personality types. Cooper described how certain undesirable traits within the personality types could effect a person’s life and also provided solutions on how to recognize and resolve undesirable traits. Cooper concluded the “*Building a New You*” session on September 16, 2015, where she educated students on how to tailor their image to promote their personal brand, steering clear of compromising situations and understanding the guidelines for successful networking in and out of the workplace.
